WHAT DO THE MUNDA BIDDI TRAIL, HONEY BEES, AND FARMERS' MARKETS HAVE IN COMMON? CATH O'DONNELL, OF COURSE!

When we last caught up with Cath O'Donnell she was training hard for her Munda Biddi Trail bike packing adventure in Western Australia, juggling her passion for bees, and helping build the Scotts Head Farmers' Market. We thought it was time to check in again to see how the ride went, and what's been happening back home.

The Munda Biddi Adventure was unforgettable, challenging and exhilarating.

That's how I'd sum it up Cath laughs. The trail pushed us to our limits some days with big climbs, long distances, rough terrain but the camaraderie with my three riding friends made all the difference. Western Australia's landscapes are incredible. Some of the views literally stopped us in our tracks. There were also some hair-raising moments: narrow descents on the edge of steep drops that felt like we were riding on a cliff edge and some major storms too! During one storm there was so much water

rushing down from the top that it was like riding through the middle of river.

We even had a bike that literally 'fell apart' on day three (luckily it was a hire!). Still, the trip's rewards far outweighed the challenges.

It was scary and exhilarating at the same time Cath admits. And winter was the perfect time to go, even if it meant braving wild weather.

Training in Scotts Head - did it help?

To prepare, Cath and her crew put in some serious kilometres. Weekly rides to Bowraville and back again (60km return), and circuits up and around "the Mountain" helped to build their endurance. They worked hard at motivating each other too keeping each other on track - literally! But nothing can fully prepare you for 1050km over two weeks. The biggest lesson was pacing ourselves, listening to our bodies, and remembering that every kilometre was part of the journey, and not just the destination Cath reflects. When it came down to it, it was the ride itself that gave us the stamina to keep going - the preparation helped, and being with like-minded good friends was invaluable, together with the scenery, the wildlife, and the sense of achieving our goal.

When we got to the end and came out at Elephant Rocks on the ocean near Denmark, it was the most incredible feeling! aside from being totally awe-struck by the view! When we finally put the bikes away it was a mixture of relief, pride and elation combined! We did it!

Coming Home - back to the day-to-day rhythm of life in Scotts

After such an adventure, Cath says the little things mean even more. I treasure the simple routines, my bees, the markets, a ride along our local roads. The trip reminded me that life is short, and that you need to grab opportunities when they come up-while you still can! And it's so good knowing you've always got Scotts Head to come back to. Future adventures are already on her mind, but planning takes care. With my bees they need my full attention right now, the markets, and coordinating with friends and work schedules, you can't just take off on a whim. While I'd be happy to go solo if necessary, I prefer to share things with good company and the right people is key! So the right timing - with the right people - make all the difference.

Bees in Bloom

Back home, with the warmer weather and early blossoms Cath's bees are buzzing again. They were quiet over winter, but now they're humming, she explains. Cath chooses to avoid chemicals, preferring natural treatments. It's more intensive and requires more vigilance, but it just feels right. I was fortunate to meet a bee keeper from New Zealand at the Markets who shared his experience and techniques with me which I've found really helpful. Cath recalls a recent swarm.

They'd all gathered on a fallen tree, and I spotted the Queen straight away. Once I popped her into a hive box, I had no trouble getting all the bees heading back to where I wanted them. Being surrounded by thousands of bees when they're still in the air swarming - it's like confetti in the wind, lightly brushing your cheeks or forehead completely dreamlike. They're not aggressive, just totally focused on their Queen. After being away from my bees, I noticed how quickly and easily I slipped back into their rhythm and how natural it was to get immersed back into my daily 'keeping' duties! I'm so lucky to be doing something I actually love doing. Honey production is on the rise again too, now. Over winter I only had enough to scrape by from market to market. Soon I'll have more jars for everyone who's been asking. And I'm starting to experiment with new honey infusions now, and beeswax products - it's exciting!



Farmers Market Momentum

The Scotts Head Farmers Market continues to grow. We've now got 10+ regular stalls, with new faces joining all the time, Cath says. The community stall gives smaller producers a chance to share what they've got, too, and we've trialled some workshops. Timing is everything though if it's a perfect beach day, people tend to want to pass through quickly. We're also lucky to enjoy the musical entertainment provided by some really great local talent which just adds to the great atmosphere! The market's new location in the Reserve Park near the Rec Hut has proven a winner. There's more shade, close access to the public amenities, and easier power supply and the feedback has been great!

Cath would still love to see more school and community garden involvement. It would add another layer to what's fast becoming a 2nd and 4th Sunday tradition.

VEGE PATCH NEWS SCOTTS HEAD COMMUNITY GARDEN

Good day again Gardeners,

We are busy Spring garden bed replanting in our lovely community garden!!

WORKING BEE PLANNED

- Saturday 11 October 2025
- FROM 8.30am
- · All welcome, bring family and friends.

Spring is the time to plant :- lettuce, carrots, silverbeet, beetroot, cucumber, zucchini, corn, potatoes, rocket, basil and tomatoes (netted).

TIPS:

- Be ready to shade garden during super hot days and keep regularly moist.
- · Water late afternoons.
- Remember good gardening needs good soils and lots of patience.
- PH testing and adjusting do well in advance before planting.
- Veggies like slightly acid soils 5.5 to 6.5.PH.
- MOISTURE can dissolve nutrients for plant use more readily, thus promoting better growth outcomes.

SH Gardeners have a digital tester if needed.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH Roast Beetroot Dip

Prep Time: 10 minutes
Cooking Time: 45 minutes

Servings: 4

INGREDIENTS

- · 4 medium sized beetroots
- 1/2 a large (or 1 small) head of garlic
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- · 200g Californian walnuts
- 200g nice quality feta
- · salt and pepper

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C. Remove the leaves and trim the roots from the beetroot. Trim the top off the head of garlic. Place onto a baking tray with the beetroot and sprinkle with oil.
- 2. Bake for 30 minutes, then remove the garlic. It should be soft. Bake the beetroot for a further 30 minutes, or until a skewer goes easily through them. In the last 10 minutes of cooking, add the walnuts to the tray.
- 3. Remove the tray from the oven and allow everything to cool down. Peel the beetroot the skin should come off quite easily. I wear latex gloves for this procedure so I don't end up with bright pink hands.
- 4. Cut into a few pieces and put in the bowl of a food processor.
- 5. Squeeze the flesh from the garlic cloves and add to the food processor along with the feta and toasted walnuts. Blitz until everything is combined. It's up to you how smooth you like your dip to be.
- 6. Taste and season with salt and pepper.

Serve with flatbread, Turkish bread, crackers or vegetable crudités
